Activities Calendar Sync Improvements & Instructions

Dear members

A feature of our website that is useful, but not too well-known, is the Activity Calendar sync feature. This feature allows members to sync the schedule of activities that they have nominated and been accepted for, to their Google Calendar, Outlook Calendar, or other sync-enabled calendar app.

For those who already use the feature, you may be pleased to know that we have made a couple of small improvements.

- The start time of synced events now matches the Meet Time of the Activity. Now you can set your alarms automatically!
- The location of synced events is now set to the meeting point of the Activity. Now you don't need to log back into the website to find out where you need to meet.

For those who do not know about or know how to use the feature, we have added a small page with instructions for syncing using Google Calendar, Outlook.com, or the Outlook desktop app. The page is currently linked at the top of the Activities Calendar, and here is a direct link:


A note about email preferences

Scenic Rim Trail - responses from bushwalking clubs to the proposal

As part of the public consultation process for the proposed Scenic Rim Trail offered by Gainsdale Pty Ltd (Spicers), bushwalking clubs were given the opportunity to provide comment. BBW advertised this to members previously and no doubt some of you provided your own comments directly via the public portal provided.

Both the BBW and the Bushwalking Queensland (BWQ) also provided responses to this proposal. BBW offered comment to specific questions provided by Queensland Parks & Wildlife Service (QPWS) and BWQ tabled a response to the entire proposal, on behalf of all bushwalking clubs. A Positive Result from a security audit of our web site!

In 2017 BBW engaged Ted Cooper as an outside consultant to assess the security of the BBW web site.

While we knew that our Web Administrator Shaun Johnston had done an excellent job of building our site, we wanted confirmation and a "second opinion" from an outside expert.

Mr. Cooper assessed these areas:

- Security from external access (including Firewall and admin access)
- Structure and protection of software and data files
- Web server which delivers content
- Email delivery
- Backups of software and data
- Periodic testing
- Other best practices

In each area, Mr. Cooper notes that the BBW Web Administrator has followed Best Current Practices in setting up the server and services that run the site. An attacker would be unlikely to currently compromise the server or running services.

Mr. Cooper made some suggestions which would provide further protections. The Web Administrator and the Technology Officer will review the suggestions in light of their costs (to site usability, time) to benefits.



Valediction to Graham Jurott

The following tribute was penned by Ron Farmer a Life Member of BBW. I (Chris Hall) had the honour of attending the funeral of Graham Jurott last Friday 13th October 2017 along with Ron, Tom Cowlishaw, Mary Comer, Alan Hobson and many other friends and relatives.


Recently, Graham Jurott passed away suddenly a few days shy of his 88th birthday.

He enjoyed exploring in the bush from a young age. Much of the bushland he loved so much then is now part of the inner suburbs of the Greater Brisbane Area.

When the Brisbane Bushwalkers Club, (BBW), was formed in 1948 he became a foundation member and enjoyed its emphasis on adventure bushwalking. He participated in its first walk, led by Bert Salmon. This walk went from a tram terminus at Salisbury to another one at Holland Park, traversing mainly through undulating bushland, a part of which survives as Toohey Forest and the Mt Gravatt Reserve. He was also present on the Stradbroke Island long distance trip from Dunwich to Point Lookout towards the end of BBW's first summer season and was an active through-walker for many years. Not surprisingly, he was on the major exploration of Carnarvon Gorge conducted by BBW members in1950 and is the author of the book Bush Walkers in the Gorge 1950, which recounts the quality survey, photographic and exploratory work done at that time.

His wife to be, Esther, joined the club soon after it started and they were married in 1954. Their honeymoon was to Melbourne, travelling there and back by motorbike, which was a shared joy for them from the beginning. Thus began an enduring relationship which lasted up until Graham's recent passing. Their enthusiasm for motorbike riding gave them the ability, in an era before cars were commonplace, to get to many otherwise difficult-to-access areas and so enjoy their love of riding, camping and walking, all in one excursion.

Graham became an Honorary Ranger under the Forestry Act in 1952 and later a warden of aboriginal relics under the then Aboriginal Relics Preservation Act. Later he would become an Honorary Protector under the Nature Conservation Act of 1974. Much work was done with others in National Parks and other Conservation areas in this capacity.

Graham and Esther worked in the photographic business for many years.

Later they continued their professional photography employment at the Medical Faculty, University of Queensland. This conscientious work frequently involved an extended working week and a dedication to the nuances of high grade professional photography in innovative, demanding, clinical and research circumstances. Their contributions have been valued and acknowledged by their colleagues. From time to time Graham was drafted to other photographic duties for the University and, always a pioneer, was an early adopter of digital technology. They also acted as wedding photographers in their own time.

For many years Graham was involved in some of Brisbane's foremost camera clubs not only as a member but serving on committees also

Graham assisted Grahame Walsh, the well known archaeologist and recorder of aboriginal art, in the field, and helping Walsh with his extensive photographic collection of aboriginal art.

Graham and Esther led an active life together especially with their growing family. As their children became older they had joined the fledging Family Bushwalkers Club, as did many of their BBW contemporaries. They seem to have enjoyed these years.

Both Graham and Esther continued their commitment to BBW and for a quarter of a century served, sometimes with the help of others, as Contact Officers for BBW. But their involvement was more wide-ranging than just as Contact Officers. Graham had been a club Safety and Training Officer and continued as a long time judge of the club's annual photographic competition. In this role he willingly imparted some of his extensive photographic knowledge to younger generations.

Graham participated as a club representative, and also an early President, of the then Queensland Federation of Bushwalking Clubs, now Bushwalking Queensland. Later Graham, Esther, and club colleagues contributed directly and indirectly to the

bushwalkers' Search and Rescue organisation, which after some rapid changes, finally became the Federation Mountain Rescue, which continues to the present. They served as Contact Officers for this group as well. As with many other organisations, both these bushwalker peak bodies and their member clubs, played their part in the volunteer response effort during and after the major 1974 Brisbane flood. Graham and Esther were again playing a pivotal role in the centre of bushwalker communications.

In the mid 1970s both Graham and Esther were awarded Honorary Life membership for their sterling contribution to the affairs of BBW. Graham's last participation in the club's affairs was as a supporter at the recent award ceremony of its newest Honorary Life Member.

It was always a pleasure for their friends to drop around and see them or to help celebrate a special birthday or other unique occasion. It was a delight for these friends and acquaintances to share reminiscences, mainly at their long-time family home, or be the beneficiaries of wise counsel when it was directly sought.

Graham and Esther, after some vicissitudes, returned to their motorbike riding in their well earned retirement and undertook other volunteer work. Chief among the later was their contribution to the Norman Creek catchment restoration group which continued enthusiastically for many years.

They bore the difficulties of life with good grace and quite admirable fortitude.

At Graham's suggestion in the early 2000's an informal picnic group for "retired" bushwalkers was created and is still active.

In recent years, as Esther's health declined Graham was her principal carer until this was no longer possible and Esther moved into a nearby aged care facility. Graham remained attentive and concerned about her quality of care always.

To those bushwalkers who were fortunate to know him personally, his balanced dedication to whatever activity he was involved in, helpfulness, loyalty, generosity and thoughtful kindness will be sincerely missed.

Trip Report: Moreton Island Basecamp

This report has been lodged by Michele Cottrell about the Moreton Island Basecamp held from Friday 14th April to Monday 17th April, 2017. Photograph contributions courtesy of Julie Van Dore.

Some stats about MI:

- 13 km at its widest
- 37 km at its longest
- 186 km2 in area
- 58 km from Brisbane
- 95% is National Park
- Highest rainfall in the local area (The Cape: 1500mm/yr)
- 3rd largest sand island in the world
- Mt Tempest, at 280m, is reputedly the highest, stabilised, coastal sandhill in the world

We used a bush camp near Blue Lagoon, run by Alan Genninges from Moreton Experience. Kitchen & eating area under cover. Milk, butter, tea & coffee all supplied. Limited refrigeration mainly for perishables like meat. We could put drinks in the fridge of a morning ready for a coldie at the end of the day!

Canvas marques with stretchers. Some of us took our own tents, camping nearby.

A friendly camp skink loves mushrooms and grapes. It does, however, do its best to avoid the carpet python that keeps the vermin away J.

Travel to MI was via the MICat ferry, arriving at the Wrecks, □1.5 hours from the Port of Brisbane

Day 1

On arrival at the Blue Lagoon campsite, we set up our beds/tents and then sat down for some lunch. In the afternoon and we were dropped at Combyuro Point to start our walk along the northern beaches with a swim at Champagne Falls. After being picked up, we drove up to Cape Moreton lighthouse and took in the views and the setting sun.

Day 2

We headed south to the Little Sandhills and some tobogganing fun! We then walked across the Little Sandhills, north along the western side and then climbed up the Big Sandhills.

Alan met us, in the distance, after we walked over a very artistic landscape. He led us back to the trusty 4WD.

Day 3

We headed to Cape Moreton and made our way to a lovely beach for a swim and to look at the local area.

Day 4

We had a short drive and walk to the bottom of the Mt Tempest track. A short, strenuous walk had us onto of the highest point of Moreton Island (with good mobile reception). Great views! We then descended and walked the start of the Telegraph Track with some spectacular displays of banksias and other flora and fauna.



Day 5

We walked towards Blue Lagoon and then around the edge of the lagoon. We then followed a track and part of the Bulwer Road and then walked a short distance through tall grasses to find Honeyeater Lake. Many of us took a quick dip. On the return trip, some walkers returned the same way and some followed the sand road to the beach and then back to the camp.

After packing up, we headed to The Wrecks and lazed around until the MICat arrived and took us back to Brissie.



Alan's bush camp, 4WD transport around the island and local knowledge, made for 5 days of great walks (about 38km) with a minimal amount of gear needed! The total cost for the weekend was \$320 – MICat fares, transport and use of the bush camp.

[If anyone is interested, MIPC also offers minimal cost weekends in exchange for weeding on MI. (They have some generous donors :)) No need to be a MIPC member :)

Costs (includes a trip to the Cape): Free for 9 hours weeding. Groups usually pay the \$40 MI Cat fare.

Brisbane Bushwalkers Club - Committee Reports 2017

What a year and a privilege it has been to serve as President for this fantastic bushwalking club. In this role you really get to see all the great work that Committee members do as well as the extraordinary efforts of those helping in non-committee roles. So thank you to all those people who lead walks; introduce new members to the club; kit out members with gear for walks; survey new walks; create social events; put on photographic competitions; perform the administrative and financial tasks; train our members in leadership, first aid, navigation and abseiling; liaise with national parks and other clubs; manage our great new website; provide library services; manage outings and activities; publish our magazine; and the list goes on.

Brisbane Bushwalkers Club has been in operation since 1948 and fast approaches its 70th anniversary. Just because it is an old club doesn't mean that it is slowing down or isn't adapting to change, in fact it's just like an ageing bushwalker, it is getting stronger and adapting to its environment like never before. Other Committee members will highlight some of these changes during the past year in their reports but some of the ones that come to my mind, are as follows.

Our transition from the old website to the new website last year has been relatively painless and still continues. We will continue to bed down and improve our new website. In particular you will see the website being re-organised into a more user friendly way and graphically enhanced.

Our liaison with Queensland Parks & Wildlife Service (QPWS) remains strong. Members co-ordinated via Federation Mountain Rescue and Bushwalking Qld, to assist in search and rescue efforts for a lost man in Lamington National Park, along with track assessments following the impacts of ex-Cyclone Debbie earlier this year. We had a hiccup with the QPWS and the use of the Mt Glorious Barracks but this has now resolved and a stronger bond and redefining of obligations of both parties has ensured the continued use of this facility. Talks have also been had directly with Rangers and our role in track and campsite monitoring is highly valued and something which I will speak further with Leaders and members about.

The BBW monthly newsletter/magazine called 'The Brisbane Bushwalker' has also made a transition from being a hard copy publication to a quarterly and monthly newsletter. The first of the quarterly newsletters for May -August 2017 is now on the website at https://www.brisbanebushwalkers.org.au/magazines and once we have done more work on the webpage you will also see a monthly email newsletter advising you of more recent changes, reports and articles. The Qld State Library was approached and is now digitising all older copies of this magazine back to 1982. If members have hard copies of editions prior to 1982, I would be very interested to know this and make them available for digitising (and return to you).

My thanks go to Graham Olive (outgoing Vice President) for his support and dedication to the organising of speakers at each meeting. Grahams attendance at club meetings and input at Committee meetings is also gratefully acknowledged. David Sydes steps down as Outings officer this year and has put in a solid effort in other roles on the Committee over the past 5 years. David's walk and club knowledge is invaluable as has been his advice and support of the club over this time. The Remote First Aid course is always popular, which not only provides first aid certificates its interactive and fun. Unfortunately, the earlier session for 2017 had to be cancelled, as we had the challenge with the activity location and our trainers relocating. Thankfully Steve and Clare (our trainers) are settled and are keen to provide this service again. Our October session is full again with more people wanting to participate and shows the value of this course.

During the next twelve months we will have two "remote first aid" courses, as I know they are wanted by the many members in our club.

Special thanks go out to our exceptional leaders who have helped me with these courses and given up their time to provide valuable knowledge to new leaders and members. It is terrific to see that a vast number of leaders are always so keen to be involved and assist with various types of training and exercises.

Only a few reportable incidents/accidents occurred over the last twelve months, which is unfortunate although considering the type of activities we engage in, it is quite low. However, from these incidents, I was impressed with the care by others to those injured and this shows the comradeship within the interactive club we all belong.

Equipment – Jenny Howell and Elena Williams

It has been a good year in the BBW Equipment department. Jenny Howell and Elena Williams continued to share the role and were very glad as it continues to quite often be very busy – so much so that we often missed out on supper! But now our friends look out for us and bring us a plate of tasty morsels!

This year we had a number of our club PLB's batteries expire so we purchased new ones. The new PLBs are very nice and lightweight and have a battery life of 10 years which is very appealing to the outdoor enthusiast. We have had quite a few club members purchase their own PLB of this sort. If any club member is interested in purchasing their own PLB we can give you more information.

The club lends PLBs to leaders free of charge. BBW is very safety conscious and supports the borrowing of our PLBs for all of our bushwalks. The club PLBs are for club use only as they are registered in the club's name and consequently the emergency contact details are all club contacts.

Our stock of lightweight tents for through-walking remains popular. The club's single and double Tarptents – Rainbows and Moments are our most popular. We also have a Tarptent Protrail which is very lightweight. We always advise the member hiring the tent to view the YouTube clip on the Tarptent website to practice pitching before venturing out into the wilderness.

Sleeping mats are also a popular item to hire and we purchased another insulated mat with a higher R-rating – very good for those chilly nights out west or in the depths of Lamington National Park.

Our men's through packs have also been a popular item to hire.

We have a lightweight tarp available to leaders free of charge for base camps or through walks if they require shelter.

Tyvek for tent groundsheets remains popular. It is very cheap at \$5 per single size (90 x 200cm) and we can cut a size to size your needs. You will often see us grappling with it on the floor at club meetings. Many thanks to Ray Glancy who sources it for us.

We only sell a few thick garbage bags for pack liners as it seems most people use specialised dry bags now to line their packs. We have small, medium and large size \$2, \$3 and \$5 respectively.

Cookers were borrowed a few times mainly by the new through-walker.

Equipment is usually returned on time. The cost of hiring equipment is per fortnight between meetings so accumulates when late. Equipment is often reserved so its return on time is important. We give the borrower a return slip with the due date to reinforce the club's terms.

I, Elena Williams, am having a break and stepping down as Co-Equipment officer and Steve Cockburn is replacing me. Steve and Jenny will make a great team and I am sure their expertise and experience will answer all your bushwalking equipment needs. I wish them well.

If needed, I will use additional monies provided by the club to purchase other gifts for competition winners. I look forward to the event!

Non-Committee Reports

Website Administrator - Shaun Johnston

This year was an eventful one for BBW on the web, with the launch of our new website and Facebook page in August 2016.

Since the launch of the new website, the technology subcommittee has been hard at work identifying ways we can make your online experience better. This has resulted in the introduction of the member dashboard with your upcoming walks and newly added walks at your fingertips, integration of personalised walk calendars with calendar services such as Google Calendar and Outlook, trip report, GPS trace and photo album creation, the beginnings of a "walk location encyclopaedia", and a number of other small features. The website has been visited around 100,000 times by about 20,000 new visitors in the last year, and about 460 of these new visitors have proceeded to complete an online member application form. Every day the website serves about 200 members and visitors, and from the time the new website went live until the end of September 2017, it facilitated over 8,000 accepted walk nominations.

The club's Facebook Page has served to complement the website as great way for people to become acquainted with the club and ask us questions about membership and other topics. The page is gaining traction, with approximately 700 followers as of October 2017.

In the coming year, we have some big plans for the website, including a visual and informational face-lift, putting more information in the "walk location encyclopaedia", more social features, and working to make members' experiences on the website even more productive and vibrant, and hopefully entertaining!

With all this in mind, I would like to gratefully acknowledge the huge contribution that Peter Lock and Gary Curtis made by bringing the previous version of the website to the club. During 2008 we successfully appealed to the Australian Tax Office that as an incorporated body we complied with the principle activities for a club to be exempt from income tax. Accordingly, we were refunded income tax paid in prior years relating to the non mutual earnings of the club.

Insurance
