Shaun and the IT subcommittee have done some work to improve the look and feel of our website!

In addition to "refreshing" the overall layout of the website with a cleaner look, we have tweaked the website's menu and content. Some of these tweaks include better visibility of the club's meeting minutes and documents, and some navigational tweaks to make it easier to get around the website. We're also adding a slideshow to the front page to give prospective members an overview of what the club offers, and we're also adding a couple of new features!

We will be adding the ability for leaders to save and manage drafts of their activities. This means that if you're a leader, when you're creating an activity on the website, you won't need to publish it right away. You can save a draft and come back and tweak it later, and then publish it whenever you like. Until the activity is published, it won't be visible on the calendar. You will also have access to a special area where you can see and manage your own activity drafts.





We will also be adding a completely new feature - recipes! Any current member will be able to create a recipe and post it into the recipes section. A new Recipes section and menu item will be added to the website, and recipes will be searchable by keywords and "tags".

Shaun will deploy the changes on 29-30 September. On that weekend, the website will be down for a few hours; Shaun will give us plenty of notice before this.

What's the annual bushwalkers Pilgrimage?

(It's important to understand that Bushwalkers cannot possibly leave a Pilgrimage without knowing the GPS co-ordinates of where the next Pilgrimage will be).

2018 Pilgrimage

Categories

The photographic competition 2018 includes two main categories:

- 1. Amateur This category is aimed at the compact camera user with no post processing on images.
- 2. Enthusiast This category is aimed at the DSLR/SLR enthusiast user, basic post processing may be used.

Sub-categories

Each main category has five sub-categories:

- **Landscape** Photographs in any natural scene which may be a seascape, mountain vista, bush scene or any scene you deem to be a landscape with little or no presence of humans. Let's see the natural wonders of the great outdoors.
- **Wildlife/Macro** Photographs may include any native wildlife encountered on your walk including any macro of fungi, flora or anything abstract you deem to be macro along the way.
- **Bushwalking/Action** We want to see what activities you are participating in the great outdoors including social activities. This category includes bushwalking, abseiling, kayaking, cycling, base camping anything sanctioned by the club but we want to see how you or your group enjoyed the action!
- **Best Capture of Natural Light** This category can include any outdoor scenery with natural light. Examples could be a sunset, a moonrise, the play of light on trees, plants or people.
- Overseas Tramping Tramping, glamping or camping as long as it is overseas and it can include anything you want. We
 want to see the natural landscape you visited as part of your holiday.

Conditions

- 1. To enter you must be an active club member. Photos you submit must have been taken from any of the Brisbane Bushwalkers Club's sanctioned activities (except for the overseas category-see 1a) since October 2017.
- 1a. To enter in the overseas tramping category, you must be an active club member and photos from this category must have been taken since October 2017) We understand not all overseas walks are sanctioned by the club but we want to see the beauty of those places through your eyes.
- 2. Winners selected for each sub category will be as follows:
- Amateur: 1st Prize, 2nd Prize and Highly Commended
- Enthusiast: 1st Prize, 2nd Prize and Highly Commended.
- 3. The Grand Champion will be selected from one of the category winners. Note: photos submitted in the overseas tramping category from walks not sanctioned by the club will be excluded from the Grand Champion prize.
- 4. Permission is granted for Brisbane Bushwalkers Club Inc. to reproduce entry photographs online, in print and via projector/screen display with the express purpose of presenting and publishing competition results.
- 5. Permission is granted for images to be shared with sponsors for publishing on their websites if requested. Photos will reference the competition and photographer.

Did you ever wonder what walks were done by the club back in the 1950's?



36 Years of Bushwalking History now digitised and available at SLQ

In breaking news, yesterday the State Library of Queensland (SLQ) announced that the whole collection of "The Brisbane Bushwalker" magazines have now been digitised and available in their Catalogue under *The Brisbane Bushwalker* (click this link).

This was funded by SLQ as part of the Community Heritage Digitisation Offer which is about building the documentary heritage of Queensland, by capturing publications which relate substantially to the history of our state - and to its cultural, social, economic, political or scientific development.

Thanks go to Stephen Simpson, Jeanette Simpson and Chris Hall for volunteering on behalf of BBW and SLQ, who got this project underway back in June 2017.

They have worked with the Reformatting Unit in SLQ who have provided the people, expertise and resources to make this happen. The reformatting Unit is part of the Queensland Memory, Published Content and Collection Preservation arms of SLQ.

To date, the collection of BBW magazines in SLQ extends 36 years back to February 1982 and it is planned to find resources to fund a 2nd stage project to submit and digitise magazines and circulars going back another 34 years to 1948 when the club was formed. These issues of The Brisbane Bushwalker have been donated by past members and also found intact in the remains of burnt club records (after a fire tragically burnt down the house where they were being stored many years ago).

Trip Report: Mt Tibrogargan - Caves Route

Posted by Chris Hall on Wednesday, 20th June, 2018

This was an awesome day with cool crisp air and plenty of sunshine. Thanks to David Sydes for initiating and leading this walk, climb and abseil. It isn't for the feint hearted as there are a couple of small sections with a good deal of exposure. David led us up the notorious chimney and assisted the rest of us through this difficult bit (graded as a 12 in climbing but felt like a 15). I can't think of a better place to have morning tea above the chimney on the northern ridge, before abseiling down.

There are 4 abseil points which are located at elevation heights of about 1. 285m, 2. 260m, 3. 200m and 4. 175m. There is a small walk in between end and start of each of these abseils, with the largest between the 2nd and 3rd points of about 30m elevation. We used a 70m static rope (doubled to 35m) which covered each of these abseils comfortably, with the 2nd abseil probably the longest.

If you are considering this activity in the future, then it would be a good idea to head to Kangaroo Point with one of the many climbers in the club (doing this privately) and get comfortable on Grade 12-14 climbs. This will get you confident on rock climbing techniques.

Brisbane Bushwalkers Club - Committee Reports 2018

President - Chris Hall

This year has been a busy one for the club in walking and for non-committee and committee business. Last year I reported enthusiastically on the efforts of the club including a number of matters in progress. This year I can advise that many of these actions have taken place. The 70th anniversary has also given us a renewed focus and energy this year to do more for the club, as we remember all the past efforts of those who have led and walked before us. So this is the 69th Annual Report of the club, with the 1st Annual Report being produced on 31st August 1949 by Mr L Simpson. That first year was a momentous one with 145 members joining and 30 outings conducted.

Speaking of the 70th anniversary, the efforts of the sub-committee led by our Social Coordinator, Anna-Lena Moore needs very worthy praise. The behind the scenes work to coordinate the dinner, choir, historic walk and gather memorabilia was enormous. I think everyone will agree that a highlight on the day was the choir's performance, an especially funny and professional effort by all

Committee members will report on their activities, so I will focus on a few of the things I've been involved in:

- The digitising of 36 years (1982 2018) of the *Brisbane Bushwalker* magazine/newsletter by the State Library of
 Queensland has been completed and my thanks go to Stephen and Jeanette Simpson for their efforts in this project. We
 are seeking a further grant to digitise publications from 1948 to 1981;
- Artefacts and historical records are being retrieved from club records and donations from past members. Some of these
 were showcased at the 70th anniversary dinner. It is hoped that more can be collated, stored and displayed in preparation
 for the 75th anniversary;
- Media events including 4 newspaper articles and a radio interview have helped to publicise the club and let the community know that we are here:
- Co-operation with the National Parks has been strong again this year. Thanks goes to Arthur Walton our coordinator and contact person to the D'Aguilar National Park. We have conducted 3 working bees at The Barracks, Mt Glorious Rd. This has included clearing of scrub around the perimeter of The Barracks, repairs to facilities, repairs to bench/table, resurfacing of outdoor covered area and maintenance of the Western Windows, Westside and Manorina tracks. My thanks also goes to Mary Comer who is our contact person for the Lamington National Park, who helps reporting of track incidents like treefalls and other impediments to walkers. Mary keeps in close contact with the Senior Ranger and is able to advise the club on any issues from the park;
- Search and rescue efforts have continued and no doubt you will have heard of the successful finding of the remains of a lost man at Lamington in early July this year, who was missing since March 2017. Our involvement with Federation Mountain Rescue (FMR) included conducting a Navigation day at Mt Glorious by Shannon Bratton and myself with assistance from Ross Ernst and Peter Rollings; and
- It has been a pleasure for me to work in the following sub-committees (SC) and I thank the chairs and participants for their efforts ie. Abseil SC, Walk Gradings SC, Technology SC, Digitisation of Magazine SC and 70thAnniversary SC.

Personally I have thoroughly enjoyed doing many walks and abseils over the past year with members of the club. After 6 years of exploration of the area, Shannon and I were able to present to the club on our findings in the Southern Plateau of Lamington National Park – of note was my marriage proposal to her on the Stretcher Track in December 2016. Our involvement in abseiling and MINiMAXs continues as we enjoy passing on our knowledge to others. We have also continued our volunteering in the Green Mountains Natural History Association and love working with the Rangers in Lamington National Park as they maintain and improve the environment within which we walk.

So I'd encourage existing members to use this opportunity to catch up with walking friends, chat to new members, hear what is happening from the Committee and also take the opportunity to share your walk experiences through small talks.

Lastly and most importantly thank you <u>all</u> for giving me the opportunity to have given 4 years to the Committee roles of Safety & Training and lastly as President. I have been blessed to have fellow Committee members that have been great to work with as they are all dedicated and have contributed greatly to the running of the club. I'd like to thank Marge Henry for her leadership whilst she was President in my first two years on the Committee and also to sincerely thank Stephen Simpson, Vice President for his dedicated support over the past year.

Outings - Ross Ernst

You get a true appreciation of just how many activities are on the club calendar when you get an email to approve each one. I'd like to thank all of the leaders that have been busy putting on their walks for the club and its members this year.

We have a truly diverse range of activities available to keep us happy and healthy. You, as a club, ran and participated in 750 activities from walking, riding, paddling, abseiling as well as many training and social events.

A special thanks to the leaders that have put on Minimaxs, welcoming new members and showing them what a great club we have and also to all the leaders keeping us fit by providing mid week training walks.

I'd like to thank the committee for the support to my role and the smooth running of the club for another year. It wouldn't be possible without you.

The hire equipment has been mostly returned on time and members have been happy to pay for longer hire if necessary.

The Tyvek has been selling well for groundsheets. Thanks again to Ray Glancy for sourcing the Tyvek rolls for us. We have sold some 'dog bags' for pack liners, although not enough to have had to replenish supplies.

Our lightweight tarp has been popular for leaders to borrow and we have recently purchased a slightly larger lightweight tarp for leaders' use only.

We now have 6 new PLBs (expiry 1/10/2029) and 10 older ones (expiry 1/11/2027) available for leaders to borrow. Of these, 8 have been on long-term loan by leaders who lead regular walks.

Steve and I would like to thank Shannon Bratton and Elena Williams for looking after the Equipment Desk when we were away.

We believe that the hire and loan of our equipment has again helped many new and some older walkers experience the pleasure of through-walking, as well as helping new members decide on the type of equipment they need to purchase. Steve and I have enjoyed our year as Equipment Officers in 2018.

Note 1 Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act Queensland (1981). The Committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report is also prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

(b) Inventories

Stock of shirts, Snake bandages and other memorabilia is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

(c) Income Tax

Under Division 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 a non-profit organisation is exempt from income tax if they are established for the encouragement of a game or sport.

(d) Insurance

The club maintains Directors & Officers Liability General Insurance for its members and their guests. The insurance has various limits, restrictions and conditions imposed, it expires 30 June 2018. The premium is paid annually in advance and is brought to account as an expense in the year to which the insurance coverage relates.

Property & Management Liability

This policy requires a disclaimer to have been signed by its members as participants and for risk management procedures to be maintained and reviewed annually. It is not a personal accident policy and relates to insuring the leaders and management of the club and its officers. The Club does not have cyber insurance.
